Essential Mathematics 30S and SEM Course Outline

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Course Description: Welcome to Essentials in Math. This course is intended for students whose postsecondary planning does not include a focus on mathematics and science related fields. Students who will be working through the modified program will receive additional assistance with their assignments. Some outcomes may not be covered, depending on the students Curriculum Modification Plan.

Course Breakdown (Units):

- 1. Puzzles and games numerical reasoning through games and puzzles
- 2. Surface Area, Volume, and Capacity solving problems with metric and imperial systems.
- 3. Financial Services and Budgets solve problems involving personal budgets and financial services.
- 4. Graphing Representations create and interpret various graphs.
- 5. Trigonometry solve problems with 2 and 3 right angle triangles.

Assignments: Students are given opportunities to work on their assignments as a class or individually depending on their skills and challenges. Tests may be completed in open book format. Marks will be distributed between students' demonstration of skills on assignments (60%) and on quizzes and tests (40%)

Assignment Policy

Deadlines

- Assignment deadlines will be announced at the time they are issued.
- All assignments must be submitted by the stated deadline at the beginning of class.

Late Submissions

- Assignments not submitted at the designated time will receive a grade of zero.
- A secondary submission date may be granted with prior approval from the teacher.

Work should be submitted in a timely manner by the end of the unit, if you are going to miss a deadline, please speak with the teacher as soon as possible to arrange an alternate date. If the work is submitted significantly after the deadline the zero will be removed, however the teacher may leave the mark as exempted based on when in the semester the work is submitted.

Classroom Expectations:

Classroom Procedures
